
COVID-19 Pandemic Update October 30, 2020

STATE

- The trend of increasing cases statewide continues.
- The state positivity rate jumped to 6.1% yesterday, with the rolling 7-day average up to 3.1%. This is the highest since June.
- Almost half of the state's towns and cities are at the orange or red alert level, representing ≈70% of the state's total population.


MONROE

- Total cases reported as of 10/29/2020: 205
- As seen on the state map, Monroe is now among 53 towns and cities in the "**ORANGE**" alert category.
- Monroe is currently experiencing case rates that are trending towards the red category.
- Yesterday, we received new information from CT DPH regarding interpretation of case data. To further refine and align with CT DPH data, we are now providing a graph of the "Average Daily Case Rate per 100k" in Monroe, which DPH began reporting in June.



State Alert Level	State Reported Case Rate per 100k	Equivalent Actual Daily Case Rate in Monroe
Red	15+	3
Orange	10-14	2
Yellow	5-9	1

 2-Week Average Daily Case Rate per 100,000: <u>13.6</u> (equals roughly <u>2.6</u> average cases per day in Monroe)



- Cases in Monroe appear to be the result of smaller social gatherings, and not connected to visiting local businesses. This is consistent with the rest of the state.
- Currently, while there have been a small number of cases in the Monroe school community, contact tracing indicates that transmission is occurring outside the school system.
- Monroe will remain at Phase 3 at this time, however we are **strongly encouraging the following:**
 - Avoid large social events and limit time with non-household members.
 - Be diligent with masks, social distancing, and hand washing.
 - The state recommends testing, even for individuals who are asymptomatic. Go to www.MonroeCT.org/COVID-19 or call 211 for information on current testing locations in our area.

Our Town has come together to help each other during this pandemic. I know that we're all experiencing COVID fatigue, and I thank you for continuing to take actions to protect you, your family, and our entire community.
